Mr. Cicale has extensive experience advising clients on matters subject to FERC's jurisdiction, particularly with regards to applications for and litigation associated with electric transmission rate incentives, cases affecting a company's return on equity, cost-of-service ratemaking, transmission cost allocation, transmission and generation interconnections, energy market manipulation, and the workings of energy markets. He has a deep understanding of both the regulated and competitive transmission business models, as well as the needs of offshore wind developers seeking to integrate their products to the land based electric system.

Mr. Cicale has held both in-house and private practice positions and, immediately prior to joining Gibson Dunn, Mr. Cicale oversaw the FERC practice of six regulated electric public utilities that are owned and managed by one of the largest energy holding companies in the United States.
